Reflections on Calgary

CACI's 2006 Convention 'Far Exceeded My Expectations'

As an elementary school teacher, I have traveled to many different places in North America and Europe, but the CACI Convention, from July 30 to August 5 in Calgary, was one of the best vacations I have ever taken. It far exceeded my expectations!

Our hotel, the Hyatt Regency, was luxurious. The rooms were spacious and lovely and the service was excellent.

The buffet breakfasts and the evening dinners were superb! A wonderful exercise gym and indoor pool were located on the 18th floor, which gave us an excellent view of the skyline. The hotel was within walking distance of the beautiful Prince's Island Park and the lovely Devonian Gardens, plus 30 quaint restaurants and shops on historic Stephen's Avenue.

Everyday was a new adventure. On Monday, I enjoyed a city tour of Calgary that included the awesome Olympic Village (site of the 1988 Winter Olympics). That evening a group of about 190 CACI members feasted on a delicious buffet dinner and had a "roarin'" time at a very funny wild west show in Heritage Park. On Tuesday, I joined a fun trip on the Whitehorn C Train, which took us to the fabulous Calgary Zoo.

On Wednesday, we journeyed two hours to the majestic Canadian Rockies, stopping at the aqua blue Moraine Lake, spectacular Lake Louise, and finally, breathtaking Banff. I loved the trees and the Scottish Banff hotel.

After lunch, we walked around the village, which reminded me of Lucerne, Switzerland. My biggest thrill was Banff's Gondola ride that took passengers 7,500 feet high to a beautiful summit. On Friday, I enjoyed a CACI bus tour to Drumheller with its miles of prairie land where many westerns, including *Open Range*, have been filmed. Drumheller is also the site of many

dinosaur and prehistoric mammal and fossil excavations. We spent about three hours at the Tyrell Museum, one of the world's best dinosaur museums. Very intriguing! Friday afternoon was spent at the historic Atlas Coal Mine, where our visit included a fascinating tour and a coal train ride.

In addition to the many CACI bus tours (they were great fun!), you could sit and relax at the hotel, take a walk to the famous Calgary Tower, or visit the third-largest Chinatown in the world.

Even though the scenery was fantastic, it was the *people* I met at this convention that made this trip so special. So many were warm, sincere, and friendly! I laughed every day and sang and danced every night. I only wish everyone wasn't so far away. A lot of comfortable bonding

CACI Organizing Young Adult Steering Committee

Catholic Alumni Clubs International (CACI) is organizing a Steering Committee of young adults (aged 21 to 35 years) from CAC chapters across the country to examine the feasibility of sponsoring a yearly CACI Annual Young Adult Convention that would complement the organization's Annual National Convention.

The CACI Young Adult Steering Committee will closely look at whether having a separate Young Adult Convention for CACers aged 21-35 would be good for the organization, encourage young adults to join CAC, and generate interest in and enthusiasm for CAC among single, professional, Catholic young adults. The Committee would entertain ideas, suggestions, and comments – both positive and negative – on the concept of a CACI Young Adult Convention. A conference call in late 2006 – connecting all members of the Steering Committee from their respective homes – will allow a free exchange of ideas and opinions and provide immediate feedback.

If the Steering Committee agrees that the idea a Young Adult Convention should be pursued, then

the Steering Committee will also review whether the young adult age range is appropriate or should be adjusted.

A CACI Young Adult Convention would be researched, planned, and run by young adults in CAC and have the full financial backing and administrative support of CACI. Using CACI's vast experience of sponsoring yearly conventions as a resource, CAC young adults could enjoy a convention with their CACI peers across the country and find the fun, friendship, and camaraderie that are hallmarks of a CACI convention.

All young adults aged 21-35 who are members of a CAC chapter (or CACI At-Large members) are welcome to join the CACI Young Adult Steering Committee. 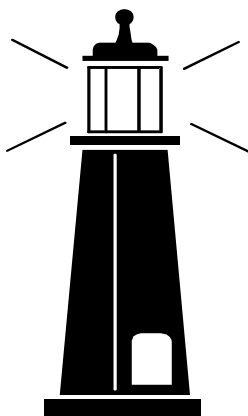
Speaking of which, the Eastern Region is currently in the planning stages for the Spring Regional that will

CACI Travel Club

Have you ever wanted to see Paris in the Springtime? London? Ireland? Tour Europe? Cruise the Mediterranean or the Caribbean? Take a river cruise down the Rhine or the Nile? Visit Australia or New Orleans during Mardi Gras? Visit New York at Christmas?

If your answer is “yes,” then perhaps the *CACI Travel Club* is right for you.

What is the CACI Travel Club?

The *CACI Travel Club* is an idea, a concept that several CACers have suggested. CACI is looking for input that will tell the organization how much interest there is in organizing such a club.

Here’s an idea of how it might work:

1. CACers would register with the *Travel Club* Coordinator by sending in their names, E-Mail addresses, postal addresses, and their CAC chapter affiliates.

2. Trips might come about two ways:

A. Member-Initiated Trips — If a CACer wishes to travel to a specific destination, has researched all the information, and sends this information to the *Travel Club* Coordinator, the coordinator can then broadcast this information to all registered members. Whoever wants to join the trip could respond to the initiating CACer.

B. Travel Club Coordinator-Initiated Trips — At least once a year the coordinator would solicit interest in a particular trip and at the same time ask for suggestions for future trips. Of course, this doesn’t have to be limited to once a year, although it probably will not exceed one trip every three months.

How Much Does it Cost to Join the CACI Travel Club? Are Fees Added to the Travel Costs?

There probably would be no membership dues as such, although the *Travel Club* is open only to CAC members. With regard to fees, that would depend on whether CACI adds any value to the package that is offered.

Let’s consider two examples:

1. If the *Travel Club* simply acts as a communications channel to broadcast travel information that an initiating CACer has already assembled, then it would

seem that CACI should not charge a fee.

2. If the *Travel Club* Coordinator plans the trip and negotiates a group discount on airfares, hotel rooms, tours, etc., then it would be reasonable to assume that an additional fee would be charged by CACI for providing participating CACers with an offering that could not be obtained on their own.

What Are Some Other Considerations about the Travel Club?

The *Travel Club* should be able to plan trips with only a few CACers. The *Travel Club* could open up trips to locations that are not particularly good choices for the CACI annual conventions because *The Travel Club* would not be limited to travel only in the Summer. Thus, weather considerations will be more flexible. The *Travel Club* could also plan trips that appeal to special interests, such as ski weekends.

Costs associated with the *Travel Club* should be minimal. The CACI Convention Coordinators print and mail reservations forms, hire bands and DJs, and commit large dollar amounts to hotel catering to secure a fee waiver on meeting space. The *Travel Club* would communicate through E-Mail (perhaps US postal mail for those without E-Mail); would not hold business meetings (hence no catering commitment); and would schedule dining and entertainment based on what would be available at the trip destinations.



How Does The Travel Club Compare to the CACI Conventions?

CACI Conventions are highly structured and have significant costs (site selection, site inspection, printing, postage, publicity, contracted DJs/bands/entertainers, guaranteed minimums to the hotel on rooms and catering). The *Travel Club* would have none or next to none of these costs and, consequently, would have maximum flexibility in planning the trip.

The *Travel Club* could schedule a group of CACers into a publicly offered tour; as such, the CACers would be a group within a larger group. The

structure would be provided by the tour company. This would be true, for example, if the trip were a cruise.

The Travel Club could also schedule a block of rooms, presumably at a discounted rate, and offer these to CACers. Dining and entertainment would depend on what would be available at the trip destination(s) rather than being contracted by CACI.

Reservations could be made in advance, but those who might want less expensive meals would have that option.

CACI Q&A

Does CACI provide CAC chapters with assistance in building memberships?

Yes. CACI provides chapters with free promotional materials to help them with membership drives. These promotional materials consists of:

1. An 8½" × 11" flyer — with a space for a name and phone number — that can be posted in the back of a church or on a bulletin board; and
2. A brochure that describes CAC and contains a perforated card that a person can tear off and mail in (Chapters need to fill in their mailing addresses).

Also, sample letters to pastors — asking them to print a pre-written paragraph about CAC in their church bulletins — are available. CAC chapters have used these letters with great success to conduct membership drives.
